Our Mission: Not School As Usual

Ceiba Nova is not a school. It's lived learning - an exploratory.

It is a living, breathing learning ecosystem—rooted in relationship, imagination, and the radical belief that education should honor the full humanity of every child.

At its heart, Ceiba Nova is a private educational experience, built to serve diverse learners through a model that blends academic rigor with deep personalization, ecological awareness, and meaningful connection. We center interdisciplinary inquiry, flexible pacing, and student-led projects—because real learning doesn't happen on a conveyor belt. It happens in *spirals, leaps, stillness, and sparks*.

The name **Ceiba Nova** speaks to this duality:

- Ceiba, the ancient tree, symbolizes deep roots, ancestral wisdom, and the interconnected web of life.
- Nova, the cosmic burst of brilliance, represents illumination, exploration, and the bold unfolding of new possibilities.

Together, they remind us that *learning is both grounded and expansive*—anchored in care and ever-reaching toward discovery.

We created Ceiba Nova for families and learners who don't want to choose between structure and freedom, between high standards and whole-child care, between academic growth and emotional safety. We believe in all of it—and we design for all of it.

Relationship-Centered

We prioritize trust, belonging, and collaboration in all that we do. From restorative circles to partner projects, from advisory groups to shared leadership, every learner is known and needed.



Neurodiverse-Affirming Design

Every learner's brain and body is different—and that's not a problem to solve. It's a strength to build from. Our environments are sensory-aware, trauma-informed, and intentionally flexible, with embedded supports and open-ended structures.



Learner-Led Inquiry

Learning begins with real questions. We guide students to wonder, explore, critique, and create. Through thematic investigations, personal projects, and collaborative problemsolving, students construct meaning that matters.



Hands-On, Minds-On

We learn by doing. Students engineer solutions, build physical models, design systems, grow food, conduct experiments, stage performances, and produce original work that reflects both academic rigor and personal investment.



Nature-Based & Planet-Aware

We don't separate "school" from "world." Whether identifying edible plants, tracking weather patterns, or mapping watershed impacts, students learn through engagement with the land and its systems. Stewardship is core to our curriculum.



Community-Minded Action

We teach toward interdependence and civic engagement. Students collaborate across ages and pathways, contribute to shared goals, and take part in real-world efforts—from school governance to environmental restoration to justice initiatives.



Depth AND Coverage

We go deep, not just wide. Our model emphasizes conceptual mastery, cross-disciplinary connections, and long-term understanding. We meet or exceed academic standards—but instead of moving on, we spiral back, reinforce, and refine.

We resist the false urgency of industrial education. Ceiba Nova's daily and weekly patterns allow time for reflection, focus, rest, and deep flow. We move with intention, not inertia.

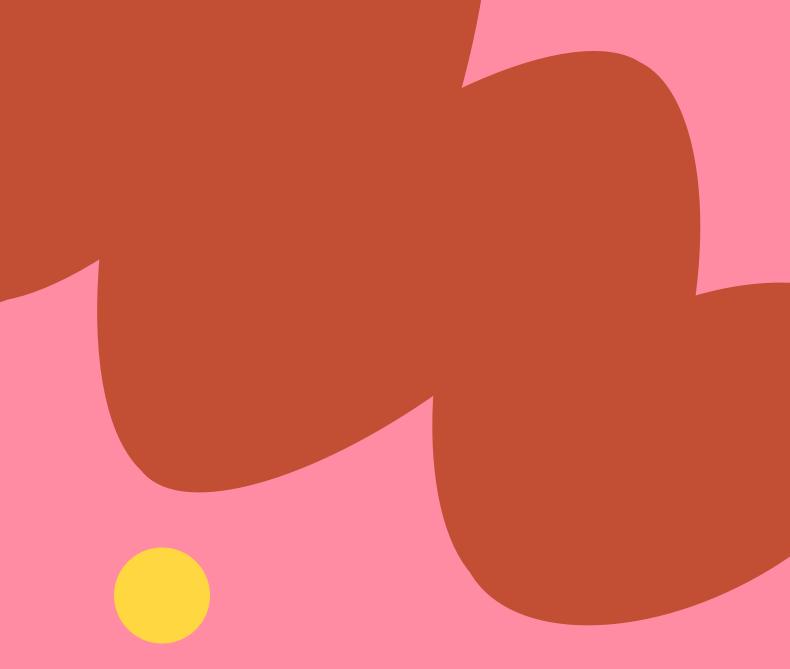
Mastery Over Seat-Time

Transparent Rubrics

Students advance when they demonstrate proficiency in clearly defined skills or standards, rather than simply logging hours. Learners may take more or less time to reach mastery, and assessments are often formative (ongoing) and summative (final).

Each competency has associated performance levels, with criteria clearly and objectively spelled out in rubrics or learning progressions.



How We're Structured

PHASES & CYCLES
PATHWAYS, BADGES, & TRACKS
GOVERNANCE & LEADERSHIP

At Ceiba Nova, **Phases and Cycles work together**—not to segment time, but to shape **a steady rhythm of engagement, expression, and transformation**. We teach and learn like life itself: in motion, in conversation, and always in relationship.

This system allows students to take time without losing momentum, and families to participate in their child's growth with autonomy and support.

Phases, Cycles, & Annual Flow

Our year-round structure is designed to support deep learning, rest, reflection, and real life. Rather than racing through arbitrary deadlines, we move through intentional rhythms that allow each student to grow, question, build, and revise at a pace that respects both their individuality and our shared community.

At Ceiba Nova, time isn't just managed — it's honored.

Four Phases, One Continuous Journey

The Ceiba Nova calendar is divided into **four intentional phases** per year. These structured blocks include approximately **9 weeks of core learning**, followed by a **2-week seasonal break**.

Seasonal breaks are the final two weeks of March, June, September, & December. Additionally, we have a rest day (for students & families) & a prep day (for staff) midway through each month in observance of national & international holidays. These occur on a Monday or Friday, with few exceptions, for the convenience of our families' & to reinforce consistent structure. Specific dates are always clarified in our annual calendar.

This rhythm supports meaningful academic progress, sustained focus, and time to recharge.

Flex Days: Honoring Individual Rhythms

We know that life doesn't always align with school calendars. Ceiba Nova families receive 16 Flex Days per student, per calendar year to support their own rhythms, needs, and values.

- Birthday Day On (or near) the student's birthday per family's preference
- **5 Anytime/Anyway Days** For rest, holidays, travel, or spontaneous joy
- **2 Flexible 5-Day Weeks** Scheduled with one month's notice. Can be scheduled in combination. *Shorter notice requires approval.*

Important Notes: Flex days **do not rollover** to the next year unless approved. Flex days are **not sick days** – health related absences are always excused. Extended health-related absences trigger a MAP review to ensure continuity and care.

Learning Cycles, Not Checkpoints

Each learner's journey moves through unique cycles of inquiry, action, and reflection—guided by their Mentored Adventure Plan (MAP) and supported by advisors, guides, and peers. These cycles are not fixed units or academic checklists. They are living processes that spiral forward through experience and insight.

This model ensures that students:

- Engage deeply with meaningful questions
- Build skills through authentic application
- Reflect on both process and product
- Reenter new learning with greater awareness and direction





We believe that real learning requires **both doing** and thinking about the doing—and that learning cycles should reflect the fluid, recursive nature of true understanding.

Pathways, Badges, & Tracks

Whole-child development, responsive academics, and purposeful direction.

At Ceiba Nova, student growth isn't siloed by age or dictated by a rigid academic sequence. It's shaped by who each learner is, what they're building, and where they're going. That's why we use a **dynamic three-part system: Pathways, Badges, and Tracks**—each serving a distinct role in guiding growth.

Pathways: Who You're Becoming



- Typically developing core skills, habits, and confidence through guided exploration.
- Earn foundational badges first to solidify core knowledge, executive functioning, & community skills.

Daily Rhythm

- Gentle start with breakfast, play, and social prep
- Core academics taught through mini-lessons + station rotations
- Daily practice of kitchen skills, shared meals, and clean-up routines
- Badge projects guided by adult facilitation and sensory-rich learning
- Movement, nature play, and creative physical activities
- Calm closing with group reflection and free play



Pathmakers Typically Ages 9-15

- Growing in independence and synthesis, able to take on more complex, interdisciplinary challenges
- Begin accumulating intermediateand advanced-level badges tied to interdisciplinary projects and Trackaligned work.

Daily Rhythm

- Self-prep and social start with increasing autonomy
- Integrated core blocks blending subjects like math, language, and science
- Leadership in meal prep and responsibility roles
- Badge work aligned to Tracks and MAP goals
- Purposeful physical wellness: skillbuilding, stamina, and coordination
- Reflective closure through journaling, group discussion, or quiet reset



StargazersTypically Ages 14+

- Operate with high levels of autonomy and initiative, preparing to apply their learning in real-world or post-Ceiba contexts.
- Often specialize—pursuing mastery-level badges in one or more Tracks, acquiring industry-recognized certifications, and developing real-world products and solutions.

Daily Structure

- Flexible arrival with optional mentor time or project setup
- Deep academic dives, research blocks, and collaborative challenges
- Student-led meal planning and food preparation
- Badge time devoted to Track work, capstone projects, and MAP execution
- Self-managed wellness activities or leadership in group sessions
- Independent closure: conferencing, reflection, or quiet decompression

Progression through academic content is responsive, subject-specific, and non-linear. Students don't wait for a Pathway promotion to begin more advanced coursework. If a learner has mastered the Math or Science course aligned to their current Pathway, they begin the next level—whether or not that's typically associated with a higher cohort.

This allows each learner to be **appropriately challenged across every subject and domain**, without being rushed or held back in areas where they're still developing. It's not about skipping ahead—it's about honoring exactly where a student is and supporting them to grow from there. Our full curriculum is explored in our *Learning in Action* section.

Our Curriculum At-a-Glance

At Ceiba Nova, our curriculum is designed to nurture the whole child—integrating academic depth, creative exploration, and real-world application. We blend proven methods like Montessori, Waldorf, Reggio, and the Socratic approach with updated psychological frameworks and the realities of a global, digital world. Our interdisciplinary structure emphasizes critical thinking, executive function, and ethical engagement, allowing students to build meaningful connections across subjects and with their communities. Learning is flexible and student-centered, guided by developmental readiness, personal goals, and hands-on experience. The result is a living, evolving curriculum that grows with each learner—rooted in care, curiosity, and purpose.

At Ceiba Nova, students don't just move through subjects—they move through identity and intention. As learners grow in mastery, self-awareness, and independence, they begin to chart their own course through one or more of Ceiba Nova's Specialized Learning Tracks: immersive, student-driven journeys that align with their Mentored Adventure Plan (MAP) and deepen their skills, passions, and personal goals.

These Tracks are not separate from our core program—they are natural evolutions of a learner's growth. Each Track supports increased challenge, real-world production, and authentic engagement, all while maintaining the same relationship-centered, interdisciplinary, and nature-connected foundation that defines Ceiba Nova.

The Five Ceiba Nova Tracks



Creative Arts & Design

For makers, storytellers, and expressive thinkers in visual, performing, literary, and digital arts.

Projects may include: exhibitions, publications, portfolios, installations, performances.



Ethical Entrepreneurship & Finance

For innovators with a vision for sustainable business, ethical economics, and social enterprise.

Projects may include: business plans, micro-enterprises, pitch events, ethical market research.



Global Communications & Advocacy

For students passionate about justice, storytelling, diplomacy, and global connection.

Projects may include: multilingual podcasts, research campaigns, Model UN, community action work.



Scientific & Environmental Inquiry

For systems-thinkers, data lovers, and ecologically aware problem-solvers.

Projects may include: original research, field studies, lab journals, ecological restoration.



Technology & Systems Thinking

For students excited by design, programming, digital infrastructure, and systems mapping.

Projects may include: app development, digital tool prototyping, ethical tech audits, robotics.



At Ceiba Nova, "prep" doesn't mean standardized test drills. It means preparing for purpose—for real futures, lifelong learning, and meaningful contribution.

How is every track a "prep" track?

Whether a student is designing a fashion line, launching a podcast, running a micro-business, or restoring a mangrove, they are:

Acquiring, applying, & practicing real-world skills in real-world situations by learning things they can actually use—like budgeting, map-reading, conflict resolution, or tool use—through hands-on experience.

This looks like fixing a leak, running a market table, leading a tour, or building something that works in the real world, not just on paper.

D2 Building ethical frameworks, developing the capacity to think critically & compassionately about the consequences of their choices—technological, social, environmental, or interpersonal. They are learning to think through what's right, fair, and responsible—not just what's possible.

This looks like asking hard questions, weighing consequences, and making choices that reflect care for others, the planet, and themselves.

O3 Creating tangible, purposeful work by building, writing, designing, or performing things that matter—to themselves, their community, or the world.

This looks like real projects with real audiences, where effort results in something lasting, shareable, and meaningful. Preparing for what comes next—on their terms by shaping their own goals, paths, and pace toward meaningful futures.

This looks like crafting portfolios, engaging in internships, filing patents, pursuing passions, and gaining the confidence to lead, create, or contribute wherever they choose to go next.

Preparation isn't about where you go.
It's about who you become—and how you're equipped to lead your own way forward.

Governance & Leadership

Shared responsibility. Transparent systems. Leadership as stewardship.

At Ceiba Nova, we believe leadership should be **relational, transparent, and accountable**—not hierarchical for its own sake. Our governance model reflects the same values we embed in learning: collaboration, voice, reflection, and shared stewardship of our community.

We aim to model the kind of leadership we hope students will practice: ethical, thoughtful, and grounded in care.

How We're Organized

Ceiba Nova is an independent exploratory and educational initiative directed by a private teacher. All programming, curriculum design, mentoring, and communication flows through this central role. Our daily operations, long-term strategy, and educational design are carried out in partnership between:

- The **Lead Guide** (Director & teacher on record) holds responsibility for:
 - o Educational design
 - Mentored Adventure Plan (MAP) development
 - o Student progress and family support
 - o Daily operations and logistics
 - o Legal compliance, documentation, and planning
 - o Community rhythm, care, and culture

This allows for **consistency, personalization, and deep knowledge of each learner**, while still building space for **shared ownership and participation** from students and families.

• Family & Community Collaborators, who contribute insights, resources, volunteer leadership, and shared decision-making

We are not a traditional top-down institution. While legal and fiduciary responsibilities are held by the school's leadership, **voice** is **distributed**—and students and families are recognized as essential partners in shaping our evolving community.

Participatory Leadership

Students and families are not passive recipients of decisions. We build in structures for meaningful participation and distributed leadership, including:

- Community Circles for reflection, celebration, and shared agreements
- Student Forums & Advisory Groups that guide projects, rituals, and feedback processes
- Family Consultations & Listening Sessions to co-design improvements and policies
- Portfolio Exhibitions & Student-Led Conferences that center learner voice and direction

These participatory systems help ensure that Ceiba Nova remains **adaptive, inclusive, and responsive** to the people it serves.

We believe that **deep learning thrives in consistent, community-rooted environments**, not in ever-expanding systems that dilute connection.

When your family joins Ceiba Nova, you can count on stability:

- Your child will not lose their teacher mid-year to institutional turnover.
- You will not return from a break to find the exploratory abruptly closed.
- You won't be asked to navigate a revolving cast of instructors or philosophies.

We are here for the long haul, building learning lives alongside the families we serve with **consistency, sustainability, and presence**.

What If Demand Increases?

If interest in Ceiba Nova exceeds our small-scale capacity, we will not expand our class or pathway cohort sizes. Our priority is to preserve the intimacy, intention, and depth that make this model work. Though not currently planned, in the event that there is both concentrated need and demand for additional Exploratories, Ceiba Nova may interview and partner with other qualified educators who wish to operate additional facilities guided by our philosophy and utilizing our proprietary curriculum. Should this ever happen, our commitment to our families remains paramount & inflexible. It is possible that at some point in the future our Ceiba Nova family may welcome extended family members but they will have their own home, Lead Guide, and community. Any affiliated pod-sites would be:

- Independently operated microsites
- Led by dedicated Lead Guides
- Using Ceiba Nova's curricular tools, badge systems, and values-based framework
- Deeply rooted in their own local communities**

Each affiliated site would carry forward the Ceiba Nova spirit:

Holistic, rigorous, sustainable education—for those who need it most.

Admissions Philosophy

At Ceiba Nova, admissions is not about prestige, competition, or exclusivity. We are not trying to "select the best" students—we are working to **create a learning community where diverse learners can thrive together**.

Our approach is relational, thoughtful, and rooted in the same principles that shape all we do: dignity, curiosity, trust, and sustainability. We welcome families who are aligned with our vision, excited about our model, and ready to cocreate a learning journey centered on growth—not perfection.

Who Thrives Here?

Ceiba Nova is especially well-suited for students who:

- OT Crave deeper connection and more meaningful work than traditional schools offer
- D3 Learn best through handson projects, interdisciplinary exploration, and intentional pacing
- O2 Are neurodiverse, creatively gifted, emotionally sensitive, or otherwise under-served by one-size-fits-all education
- O4 Benefit from strong relationships, consistent routines, and a lowstimulation, high-trust environment

We welcome families who:

- Value open communication, flexibility, and true collaboration with their child's educator
- Are willing to challenge outdated educational models and embrace purposeful, research-based alternatives
- Seek a consistent, long-term relationship with a learning community
- Believe in rigorous, standard-aligned academics grounded in **secular principles**, **scientific evidence**, and a **human rights-centered worldview**
- Support dignity, equity, and intellectual integrity for all learners—regardless of background, identity, or belief

Seeking Alignment, Not Elitism Rooted in Relationship, Not Rankings

While we do not "select" in the conventional sense, we do take care to ensure that Ceiba Nova is the right match for each child and family.

Our admissions process includes:

- A family interview and student visit
- Collaborative reflection on needs, rhythms, and goals
- A clear and mutual understanding of what Ceiba Nova is and isn't

This approach protects the integrity of our environment and supports each student's long-term success—not just short-term accommodation.

Our Commitments

- We NEVER screen by ability or disability, gender, ethnicity, or socioeconomic status.
- We meet students where they are—academically, socially, and emotionally—and grow from there.
- We offer flex schedules, alternative enrollment and attendance options, and will make honest recommendations to other academic institutions in accordance with learner and family needs.

- We actively HONOR neurodiversity, gender expansiveness, and cultural differences.
- We offer rolling admissions as space allows, and we take the time to ensure every placement is truly in the learner's best interest.
- While our rates are fixed and transparent, we will work with each family to help with their financial and resource needs. We track arrangements using an objective financial equivalency algorithm and make the agreement details (though not the parties' identifying factors) available for all enrolled families to view.

Students at Ceiba Nova are active participants in placement, planning, and self-reflection from the very beginning.

Equity & Access

We believe that **education is a right, not a reward**—and we work to make that belief real, one family at a time.

We are committed to offering Ceiba Nova's model to those who need it most. Our tuition structure is designed to be **transparent**, **flexible**, **and values-aligned**, and we actively seek to reduce barriers for families with financial need, systemic disadvantage, or past educational trauma.

Placement, Readiness, and Learning Profiles

Meeting each learner where they are—and building the right support to help them grow.

At Ceiba Nova, we don't rely on traditional grade levels, arbitrary benchmarks, or high-stakes testing to determine where a learner "fits." Instead, we begin with a holistic picture of the student—grounded in reflection, relationship, and rigorous assessment—to shape a learning experience that is both appropriately challenging and deeply supportive.

This is not a system learners are placed into. It is a process they are part of.

Pathway Placement

Each student is placed into one of Ceiba Nova's three developmental Pathways—**Wayfarer**, **Pathmaker**, **or Stargazer**—based on overall readiness, not just age. These Pathways reflect increasing levels of independence, complexity, and leadership capacity.

Placement takes into account:

- Cognitive and emotional development

Progression through academic content is responsive, subject-specific, and non-linear. Students don't wait for a Pathway promotion to begin more advanced coursework. In addition to deep listening and direct observation, Ceiba Nova uses **formal educational diagnostics** to support accurate placement and informed instructional design.

These include:

- Ongoing evaluation and goal-setting, in collaboration with both students and families, to adjust support and stretch zones as learners grow
- Pull educational psychology assessments reviewed by a licensed, credentialed educational psychologist (California) to identify learning types, attention profiles, executive function needs, and neurodivergence (including ADHD and autism spectrum characteristics)

n alignment with U.S. educational standards, **our evaluations are not medical diagnoses**, but they are **formal, research-based educational assessments** designed to inform instruction, guide planning, and support the development of each student's Mentored Adventure Plan (MAP) with rigor and clarity. These assessments are conducted with full family awareness and participation, and are included as part of core services for enrolled Ceiba Nova students.

For alternatively enrolled students—such as those receiving homeschool or mentor support—any assessment-related fees will be clearly disclosed and agreed upon in writing **prior to the start of any evaluation process**.

All assessments and evaluations at Ceiba Nova exist solely to support the student—they are used to identify strengths, learning needs, and the best strategies for success. Modules & Blocks

Block rotation allows for deep engagement without monotony, supporting both **continuity of skill-building** and **interdisciplinary integration**.

Module 1: Foundational Learning Blocks (A & B)

These blocks focus on core academic disciplines, providing students with structured, skill-building experiences in areas such as:

- Language Arts
- Mathematics
- Science & Scientific Thinking
- Social Inquiry
- Research & Reasoning
- Communication & Expression

Learning during A & B blocks is still **dynamic, hands-on, and inquiry-based**—but it begins from a **subject-specific lens**. Students engage with academic content through intentional exploration, guided instruction, collaborative discussion, and practice-based mastery. Projects may emerge, but *the discipline drives the learning*.

Module 2: Applied Learning Blocks (C & D)

These blocks prioritize interdisciplinary, purpose-driven learning aligned to each student's:

- Pathway identity and readiness
- Emerging Track interests
- Personal MAP (Mentored Adventure Plan) goals

In C & D blocks, students explore ideas, challenges, and creative pursuits where the **topic**, **project**, **or driving question comes first**. Core academic skills from A & B are applied within these contexts—woven into **real-world inquiry**, **meaningful production**, **and hands-on experimentation**. This is where curiosity leads and academic learning is made relevant, embodied, and transformative.

At Ceiba Nova, our A–D block rotation isn't based on fixed subject slots—it's built to offer flexibility without losing structure or accountability. While Blocks A & B form our Core Module and prioritize discipline-based learning (such as mathematics, language arts, science, or social inquiry), the specific subjects covered in each block may shift week to week. For example, one week Block A might focus on math and poetry; another week, it might center on Spanish and geography. Blocks C & D, within our Applied Module, are designed for interdisciplinary application—often tied to a badge project or Track-aligned goal. One may build directly from the week's core learning; the other might support a long-term creative or research pursuit.

We develop our schedule using government-supplied pacing guides as a foundational framework, ensuring that all required subjects are covered consistently and thoroughly. However, our interdisciplinary approach means that subjects are rarely taught in isolation. On a "math" day, for example, math may be the primary lens—but students might write in English and Spanish, apply concepts through gardening or art, or integrate measurement into a science or design activity. This structure balances deep focus with natural integration, allowing us to meet and exceed core standards while cultivating real-world thinking, connection, and creativity.

Anchor Themes

At Ceiba Nova, each day of the week carries a recurring theme that helps anchor learning, support engagement, and build meaningful connections across disciplines. These themes offer both structure and flexibility—allowing educators to design rich, responsive experiences while helping students anticipate the flow of their week.



Movement & Motivation Mondays

We begin each week by activating both body and spirit. Mondays often incorporate physical movement—like kinesthetic math games, yoga for focus, or creative dramatics. Other times, we center on internal motivation—setting personal goals, exploring resilience, or connecting with our "why." Whether active or reflective, Mondays are about momentum.



Water & Waves Wednesdays

Wednesdays immerse us in the study of flow and movement—across both nature and physics. Some weeks focus on water: from pond-life studies to river poetry and splash-based science. Other weeks, we explore wave phenomena like sound, light, and motion through hands-on experiments and cross-disciplinary projects. It's a day for dynamic discovery.



Trees & Trails
Tuesdays

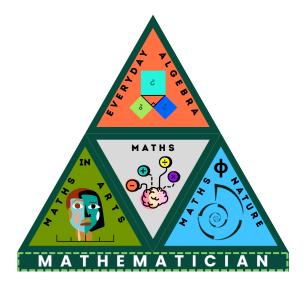
Badges & Explorer Products

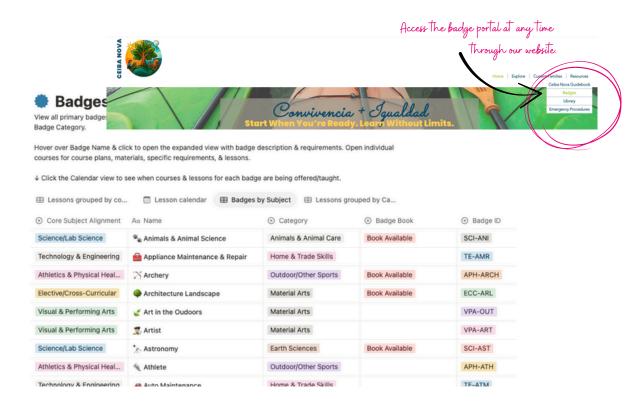

This design acts as a **built-in safety net**: students begin with **foundational Core Badges**—like *Science* or *Creative Play*—and from there, they can launch into more specialized work in areas such as *Chemistry*, *Electricity*, or *Environmental Science*.

How quickly a student progresses through these early badges depends on many things: confidence, readiness, learning experience, executive function, and personal motivation. Some explorers move through their first badges quickly because the concepts are already familiar or the tasks feel manageable within their current context. Others take a more deliberate pace—and that's exactly how the system is designed to work.

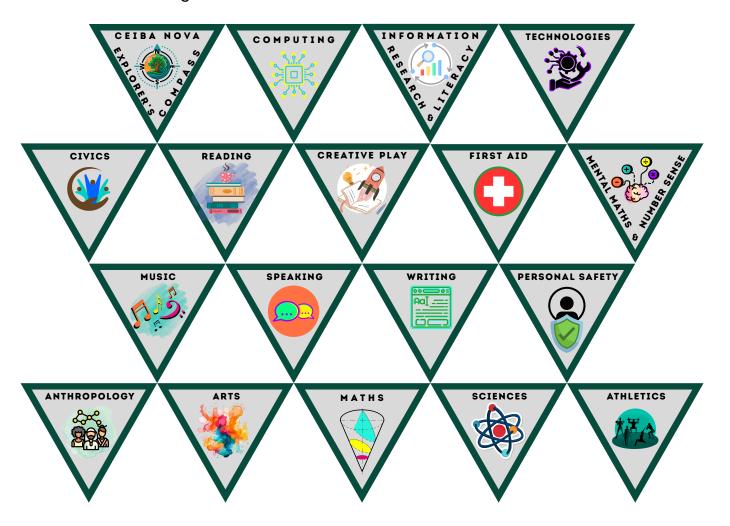

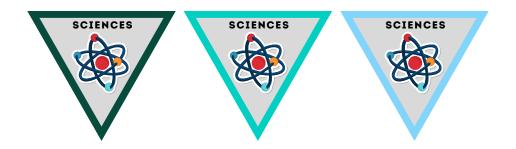
Our Core Badges are:



Completing a Core Badge is more than checking off tasks—it's a **rite of readiness**. These badges are often **co-requisites or prerequisites** for advancing into more specialized work. For example, before a student can pursue the Electricity badge or Environmental Science, they must first complete the Core Science badge. This ensures explorers have a shared foundation and a clear sense of the landscape before venturing further into their chosen fields.

To help understand the breadth and purpose of our Core Badges, let's take a look at the **Science Badge as an example**. Earning this badge means that a student:

- Understands what science is and how it works
- Can document observations and investigations with clarity
- Knows how to write a basic lab report
- Is familiar with key science terms, instruments, and data collection tools
- Follows safety procedures confidently, both in and out of the lab
- Begins to explore the ethics, responsibilities, and mindset of a scientist



It's not about memorizing every scientific fact—it's about **building the habits, language, and thinking** that real scientists use every day.

That's the spirit of every Core Badge: to **equip each explorer with the confidence, competence, and curiosity** to take on whatever comes next.

Competency & Elective Badges: Sharpen Your Skills, Follow Your Curiosity

Once Core Badges lay the foundation, it's time to go deeper. That's where **Competency Badges** and **Elective Badges** come in—designed to help students refine skills, explore interests, and produce meaningful, realworld work.

Competency Badges

Competency Badges are **structured in intentional learning progressions**, often built in three tiers to reflect a student's growing mastery:

Tier 1: Foundations and fundamentals
Tier 2: Applied understanding and practice
Tier 3: Mastery, leadership, or precision-level skill

Think of these tiers as progressions equivalent to

Novice → Apprentice → Tradesperson OR Beginner → Proficient → Advanced.

These tiers often align with the increasing complexity and independence found within our student Pathways.

Some badges also include **pre- and co-requisites**—related badges that must be completed alongside or prior to beginning a series. For example, *Safety & Maintenance for Archers* must be completed before beginning Archery 2 and is a co-requisite for Archery 1. This ensures students are prepared, responsible, and confident as they engage in more advanced or equipment-based learning.

Competency Badges are where **students hone their craft**—whether they're learning to track wildlife, design digital games, or compose music for performance. This is **learning that's active**, **hands-on**, **and rooted in purpose**.

Elective Badges

Elective Badges offer a **flexible, interest-driven pathway** for explorers ready to branch out or dive deep. These badges often **cut across disciplines**, connect to passion projects, or provide **specialized training**.

Some Electives are light and exploratory. Others are rigorous and challenging—like *Bow Building* or *Criminology*—and may have specific prerequisites, co-requisites, or project-based requirements. These badges are powerful opportunities to customize your journey while still contributing to broader badge goals.

For example, *Typing, Dictation, & Editing* fulfills a Specialist Badge requirement for Researcher, Historian, Linguist, and Trade Specialist, and also counts toward the Super Badge for Writer. **One badge—many connections**.

Electives are a space to follow your curiosity, build new skills, and forge unexpected connections. Whether for enrichment or to support a future Super Badge, every Elective is a chance to learn something new about the world—and yourself.

Super Badges & Specialist Badges: Mastery with Purpose

At the peak of each explorer's badge journey are Super Badges and Specialist Badges—earned through dedication, deep study, and the kind of authentic mastery that can't be faked.

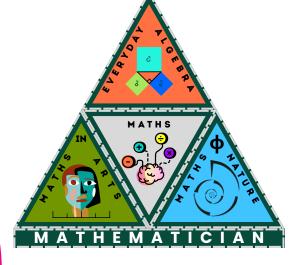
While they share a similar structure, these badges celebrate **two distinct kinds of achievement**:

Super Badges: Subject Mastery

Super Badges are awarded to students who demonstrate breadth and depth in a subject area. Each one is **anchored by a required Core Badge**, plus **three additional badges** from within the same subject family.

For example, to earn the **Scientist** Super Badge, a student must first complete the **Science Core Badge**. From there, they **choose any three additional badges in the Science Inquiry, Fieldwork, & Stewardship domain**. One student might choose Conservation, Environmental Science, and Naturalist. Another might pursue Electricity, Energy, and Magnets & Magnetism. Both earn the Scientist Super Badge—each through a path that reflects their unique interests and strengths.

Super Badges are visually formed by **four triangular badges**—the Core in the center, surrounded by the three supporting badges—creating a **symbolic "super triangle."** The earned title, like Scientist or Artist, forms the solid foundation underneath.



Super Badges reflect sustained work, interdisciplinary thinking, and the ability to connect knowledge across projects. They are required for graduation from Ceiba Nova.

Ceiba Nova Super Badges are: Anthropologist, Artist, Athlete, Citizen, Explorer, Reader, Mathematician, Scientist, Speaker, & Writer.

Specialist Badges: Precision & Passion

Specialist Badges represent the **highest degree of topic-specific expertise** in our badge ecosystem. Like Super Badges, they **require a primary badge plus three related supporting badges**—but with a deeper focus and often more advanced or technical work.

In some cases, earning a Specialist Badge even requires a Super Badge as the primary badge, signaling that the student has already achieved subject mastery before diving into specialization. These rare Specialist Badges feature a custom-designed center badge to mark the honor.

Specialist Badges allow students to carve out a niche, **showcase advanced production or scholarship**, and contribute to their community of practice in meaningful ways.

We don't rank, label, or penalize students. Instead, we use **rubrics** and reflection tools that foster **clarity, confidence, and ownership**. Students are regularly invited to assess themselves and their peers, building **metacognition, empathy, and accountability**.

Feedback loops are embedded in every phase of the learning cycle.

Students don't just receive assessments—they co-create them.

Competency-to-Credit Framework

There are **two components** that factor into competency definition & weighting: Common Core **Standards** (CCSS), Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), & relevant/supplement MEP & EU Standards & **Competency Products**.

Ceiba Nova Exploratory **objectively and consistently convert competencies to credits** that meet Costa Rica, United States, & EU Standards by applying the following steps:

A competency product is the **tangible demonstration of a student's understanding and applied skill** in a specific learning target or standard.

This product may take **many forms**—such as a written article, multi-episode podcast, student-designed lab, constructed object, performance, annotated diagram, fieldwork log, or multimedia presentation—depending on the badge requirements, the subject area, and the student's personal learning style or goals. All products are **highly structured**, **student-driven**, **and layered**.

All competency products are **guided by clear criteria and must demonstrate mastery**, not just completion. Students may revise and refine their product as they grow in understanding, and most badges allow for choice between **multiple formats or interdisciplinary expressions of competency**.



Podcast Series: Strong Voices, Brave Hearts

As part of the **Media Badge**, this student-created podcast empowers girls around the world through honest interviews, inspiring stories, curated song lists, and affirming messages. It demonstrates **mastery of digital production tools**, **communication standards**, and **English speaking skills** while centering emotional literacy, empathy, and advocacy.

Competency Weighting to Credit Earned

In our system, each course or badge is made up of a series of **discrete, tiered competencies**—individual building blocks of knowledge and skill. Mastery of each competency contributes proportionally to the full credit value of the course, and partial credit is awarded immediately once a competency is met. This ensures **student progress is visible, portable, and cumulative**.

Importantly, students are not locked into a traditional course sequence. Because competencies are shared across multiple badges and courses, a student can advance to the next tier of a specific skill while still working to master others. For example, a learner who has fully grasped data interpretation and function transformations can begin engaging with advanced applications of those concepts—even if they are still developing proficiency in related areas like exponential functions or proof-writing.

This approach eliminates the artificial boundaries created by conventional course titles (e.g., Algebra I, Geometry, Trigonometry) and instead focuses on mastery of the standards themselves. By organizing learning through a continuum of competencies rather than static courses, students can move forward in specific areas of strength while continuing to build skills where they need more time and support.

This example illustrates how this works in practice. The student has **mastered 13 of 18 competencies** from badges aligned with US 8th grade Maths but have not completed their competency product. They have **earned 0.7 credits**. Once the remaining 5 competencies are mastered & product delivered, the final 0.3 credits will be awarded.

Proficiency Thresholds & Rubrics

At Ceiba Nova, our **standards-based grading scale** serves as the **foundation for all rubrics and assessment tools**. Each competency or product is assessed using clear, specific criteria that align with this scale, and rubrics are customized to reflect the context of each project or subject area.

The purpose of a rubric is to provide clear, unambiguous guidelines and expectations—not just for what a student must demonstrate, but also for the range of methods, mediums, and approaches by which those expectations can be met. Rubrics are shared with students and parenting adults in advance, ensuring transparency and shared understanding.

They are **reviewed regularly with students, and students are invited to propose revisions** when appropriate, so long as the revisions align with our core standards and grading logic. This process ensures that assessment is not only **consistent and objective**, but also **empowering and responsive** to individual learners.

Records, Graduation, & Transcripts

All academic progress, enrollment records, and transcripts are managed through our secure Student Information System (SIS), powered by OpenSIS.

Because we track standards-based learning using traditional grade-band groupings—aligned with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and other international frameworks—in our Learning Records System, each student's progress is mapped in a way that is easily understood and transferable across educational systems. This allows us to generate transcripts that clearly show which competencies have been mastered, which grade-band standards they fulfill, and how those align with typical course expectations.

By organizing mastery data in this way, we ensure that even though our learning structure is customized and interdisciplinary, students can still demonstrate academic progress in the language and format most schools and institutions expect. This level of transparency and alignment makes Ceiba Nova transcripts fully transferrable and internationally recognized, supporting students in applying to other schools, programs, or universities with confidence.

Students receive formal transcripts, credit equivalencies, and portfolio documentation that are:

- Recognized by US and European K-12 schools and universities
- Aligned to grade-band expectations, international benchmarks, and core standards
- Backed by narrative evaluations and badge-based evidence of competency
- Flexible enough to reflect alternative pathways, hybrid learning, or interdisciplinary credits

Students work to build a **personalized Portfolio** over time and create a web-based version for graduation. The Portfolio demonstrates not just academic readiness, but also **personal growth, creative output, applied learning, and community impact**. This portfolio travels with them—whether into secondary school, entrepreneurship, travel, apprenticeships, or higher education.

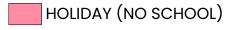

Our daily rhythm at Ceiba Nova begins and ends with thoughtful transitions that support social connection, emotional regulation, and readiness for learning. To preserve these essential bookends to the day, we ask families to follow the **guidelines** below.

Facility Access &

The school grounds **open at 8:30 AM**. The entry gate is locked before this time, and **no drop-offs are permitted** prior to 8:30 for any reason. Ceiba Nova's small size and private access mean drop-off is smooth and timely, with **Drop-Off** no external traffic concerns.

Morning Transition (8:30-9:00 AM)

As students arrive, they ease into the day with optional breakfast, free play, and self-preparation activities. We strongly encourage arrival by 8:45 AM so students can fully participate in this transition window. Core learning begins promptly at 9:00 AM.

Afternoon Transition & Pickup (3:00-3:30 PM)

Our closing block includes whole-class reflection, light play, and social connection. To protect the integrity of this time, early pickups before 3:15 PM are strongly discouraged unless previously arranged.

Drop-Off Policy

- Adult must sign in their child upon arrival.
- Children must be escorted through the gate by an adult.
- If arriving after 8:55 AM, parenting adults should notify in advance.

Pick-Up Policy

- Only authorized individuals listed on the child's emergency contact form may pick up the child.
- Late pick-up fees of \$1/min apply after 3:30 PM
- Parents must sign out their child before leaving the premises.

At Ceiba Nova, food is more than fuel-it's a foundation for learning, responsibility, and community care. Students actively participate in meal preparation, serving, and clean-up, guided by their MAP goals, Badges, and individual needs. Mealtime becomes an opportunity to practice communication, executive functioning, and meaningful contribution.

Food, Meals, & Shared Responsibility

Tuition includes **daily meals and snacks**, made on-site using whole ingredients and seasonal availability. Our focus is on **nutritious**, **well-balanced**, **minimally processed foods** that students can help prepare and understand.

Meals often include:

- Fresh fruits and vegetables
- Whole grains (quinoa, oats, rice, millet)
- Wraps, sandwiches, and burritos
- Salad bowls and warm grains with toppings
- Tapas- or charcuterie-style small plates
- Smoothies with whole fruit and no added sugar (some include honey or pineapple)

We avoid artificial dyes, chemical additives, and highly processed ingredients. When baking or decorating, we use plant-based, all-natural dyes.



We also prepare a variety of **house-made items**, including:

- Greek yogurt, made in-house with pasteurized milk
- Fresh breads, including sourdough, flatbread, and gluten-free varieties
- Special seasonal dishes tied to cooking lessons or cultural learning

Our garden harvests are used in meals whenever possible, allowing students to experience the full cycle of planting, growing, harvesting, and preparing their own food.



Allergies, Dietary Needs, & Limitations

Ceiba Nova is **not an allergen-free facility**, but we **take allergies seriously**. If a student has a life-threatening allergy, we will:

- Remove that ingredient from our meal plans
- Screen all products for trace ingredients
- Keep an EpiPen on-site with staff trained in emergency response
- Work directly with families to build a safe, sustainable food environment

If your child has a life-threatening allergy, please work with the school to create an Allergy Action Plan. Please note that EpiPens & Emergency Medication must be provided if the child has a severe food allergy.

Before handling tools or ingredients, students complete **food-safety training appropriate to their age and ability**. All kitchen activities follow standard food safety protocols and staff supervision.

At Ceiba Nova, we equip students with what they need to learn, grow, and explore—without placing unnecessary costs or burdens on families. Our approach to supplies and dress reflects our values: **function**, **flexibility**, **and respect for individuality**.



We follow the basic **MEP uniform guidelines**, but with **flexibility** that reflects our learning philosophy and minimizes cost. Our Dress Code & Uniform are **gender-inclusive**. Here's how it works:

Shirt (Top Half)

- All students are expected to wear an official Ceiba Nova uniform shirt daily. This includes any school-issued or approved shirt with the Ceiba Nova logo.
- **To reduce cost** for families, **we also offer iron-on logos** for those who wish to apply them to solid-colored shirts they already own.

Bottoms (Lower Half)

- Students may wear any style of bottoms (shorts, pants, leggings, skirts, etc.) that are comfortable and appropriate for the day's activities, in one of the Ceiba Nova colors. Skirts must be worn with bike shorts or skirt shorts underneath to ensure maximum level of comfort and engagement in all activities.
- This requirement is flexible in brand and style—we source the most affordable options and provide direct links for easy ordering of preapproved bottom options in a range of styles, Ceiba Nova colors, and prices. We do NOT profit off links or sales of required clothing.
- On Field Work or Field Trip days, we ask students to wear their Official Ceiba Nova uniform shorts.

Free Dress Days

- We celebrate individuality with occasional Free Dress and Thematic
 Celebration Days, announced in advance. The only dress codes rules we
 have on these days are that a student should feel safe, respected,
 empowered, & comfortable in their clothing of choice.
- For the health & well-being of all students, clothing may not display logos or images referencing age-specific or illegal substances or substance use, or sexually explicit or suggestive content.
- Their bodies, Their values, Their choice that's the dress code.

Durability & Mess-Friendly

• Our **students move**, **build**, **explore**, and sometimes **get messy**. **Uniforms reduce clothing stress** and help students focus on their work—not what they're wearing. Additionally, our badges can be re-applied as needed, depending on the student's display choice (sash, vest, shirt).

Shoes

Students should wear **comfortable**, **functional footwear** appropriate for active, outdoor, and hands-on learning. However, Ceiba Nova maintains a **shoeless indoor environment**—students remove their shoes upon entering the classroom and may remain **barefoot or wear socks** during indoor learning time.

For outdoor and active use:

- Open-toed shoes (e.g., sandals) are allowed but each student must also have a pair of closed-toed shoes available on-site for activities where safety is a concern (e.g., tool use, building, hiking, or athletics). Muck/rain boots may meet this criteria or a pair of closed-toe shoes may be sent with students on days they choose to wear open-toed shoes.
- Each student should also keep a pair of muck boots or rain boots at school to use during:
 - Creek exploration and water play
 - o Gardening or muddy projects
 - o Rainy-day outdoor lessons and transitions

This ensures students stay comfortable, safe, and fully able to participate in all aspects of our program—without ruining everyday shoes or missing out on learning.

Spare Clothing Requirements

Each student should keep a **full set of backup clothing** at school, including:

- 1 pair of pants
- 1 pair of shorts
- 2 shirts
- 2 pairs of underwear
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 swimsuit (see guidelines below)
- 1 towel

These are for comfort and care in the event of water play, art projects, mud, or unexpected messes. All students have access to a **private**, **locking bathroom** for changing.

Swimwear Guidelines

Swimming is part of our weekly rhythm. Students should have a swimsuit that:

- Offers t-shirt and shorts-style coverage (for sun protection, not modesty)
- Can be put on and taken off independently by the student
- Is paired with a towel (kept & laundered on campus), and preferably:
 - Goggles (Froggles or similar, easy to self-manage)
 - Fabric **swim cap** for students with longer hair

We apply sunscreen before all swimming activities, but due to our location close to the equator, we emphasize physical sun protection in addition to sunscreen. Additional swim and activity-related information can be found in the Athletics & Physical Wellness section.

Additionally, we do have on hand extra goggles but it is more challenging to achieve a perfect, personal fit with shared equipment.

At Ceiba Nova, consequences are not punishments—they are learning moments that restore integrity.

Conflict is not avoided. It's navigated. Accountability is not imposed. It's co-owned.

Agreements for Learning & Living Together

At Ceiba Nova, we don't manage behavior with rigid rules or punitive systems. Instead, we build **community agreements**—collaborative commitments that reflect our shared values, lived experiences, and mutual care.

These agreements are not static policies. They are **living conversations**, shaped by the real needs of our group, revisited often, and held together with consistency, reflection, and trust.

Why Agreements?

Community agreements are part of our larger commitment to **positive behavioral supports and relationship-centered growth**. They reflect a belief that all learners—children and adults—are capable of self-regulation, self-awareness, and repair.

We use agreements because they:

- Honor the **dignity and agency** of every member of our community
- Create a framework for clear expectations and consistent care
- Prioritize self-regulation over external compliance
- Make space for growth, not shame

Our approach is deeply informed by the **Nurtured Heart Approach** and **PBIS** (Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports) practices.

This means we focus on:

- Recognizing and energizing success
- Naming positive choices with specificity
- Creating meaningful boundaries with warmth and clarity
- Reinforcing connection over control

How Agreements Are Made (and Remade)

We

We co-create agreements through:

- Community circles and group discussions
- Reflections on real-life scenarios
- Developmentally appropriate scaffolding of ideas like consent, space, empathy, and repair

And we revise them through:

- Group check-ins and self-assessments
- Restorative conversations
- Reflection after moments of friction, harm, or misunderstanding

Importantly, when conflict occurs, we always ask questions—even when a student takes responsibility voluntarily.

Because:

- No situation is ever one-sided
- Communication styles, tone, and timing often shape how a moment is interpreted
- Taking responsibility is important—but understanding the full context is essential to restoring trust and learning from the experience

At Ceiba Nova, discipline doesn't mean punishment—it means deepening understanding and restoring connection.

We don't ask "Who's to blame?"

We ask "What happened, and how can we move forward—together?"

Examples of Living Agreements



Agreements often emerge in age-appropriate language, and may include:

- We treat others—and ourselves—with care.
- We speak honestly and listen with our full attention.
- We ask before taking, touching, or joining.
- We give space without shaming.
- We clean up what we use and help others when we can.
- We take responsibility—and explore the full story.
- We use our voice to protect, not to harm.
- We repair relationships, not just behavior.

Conflict, Repair & Restorative Practices

Accountability with dignity. Consequences without punishment.

At Ceiba Nova, we teach students to navigate conflict with clarity, courage, and care. We do not treat missteps as infractions to punish—but we also don't pretend that harm has no weight. Our approach is grounded in truth: **actions have natural consequences**, and our role as educators is to help students understand, process, and take ownership of those consequences **without shame or avoidance**.

We don't rely on reward charts or behavior contracts.

We rely on **relationships**, **reflection**, **and real-world relevance**.

Our Approach

We are guided by:

- Clear, co-created community agreements
- The Nurtured Heart Approach, which emphasizes emotional regulation, strength-based feedback, and consistent boundaries
- Trauma-informed practices that protect psychological safety while encouraging self-awareness
- The belief that restoration is not a goal—it is a result of meaningful accountability, not a shortcut or script

Natural Consequences, Not Punishment

At Ceiba Nova, no student is ever punished. But that doesn't mean there are no consequences.

When harm is caused—whether to people, materials, space, or trust—students are supported in understanding:

- The natural repercussions of their actions (e.g., lost trust, broken materials, time lost to repair)
- The **impact** on others' emotional or physical safety
- The interruption to the community's shared rhythm or agreements

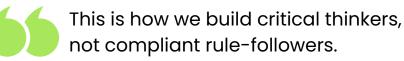
These consequences are not imposed—they are explored together through conversation, reflection, and supported action.

For example:

- A student who breaks materials through carelessness may be asked to repair or replace them

Consequences are always:

- Proportional

What Happens When Conflict Arises?

Whether it's a peer disagreement, a breach of trust, or repeated disruption, we approach each situation by asking:

- What happened?
- What were you needing or feeling at the time?
- What impact did it have on others?
- What happens now to repair and to rebuild trust?

Restorative conversations are a common tool—but they are just one piece of a larger process that may include:

- Loss of certain privileges (temporarily and clearly explained)
- Increased scaffolding or adult support
- Structured opportunities for skill-building
- Practical follow-up actions aligned with the harm caused

We do not pretend every conflict can be resolved in one circle. We work **over time** to restore trust, not just settle a moment.

Voluntary Responsibility ≠ the Full Story

Even when a student takes ownership quickly, we continue asking questions. Why?

- Because communication differences often shape how events are experienced and interpreted
- Because power dynamics (age, language, neurotype) matter
- Because we care more about understanding the whole truth than assigning blame

What Students Learn Through Consequences

- Emotional regulation
- How to take responsibility without collapsing into guilt or defensiveness
- How to identify and express needs
- How to notice the impact of their behavior on others
- How to make amends meaningfully
- That boundaries are acts of care not rejection

Neuroscience confirms what children have always known: **laughter, music, movement, and wonder accelerate learning and well-being**. Joy regulates the nervous system. Ritual creates psychological safety. Celebration solidifies memory.



Joy Is Developmentally Serious

At Ceiba Nova, we don't wait for joy to happen—we **make space for it on purpose**. Because every learner deserves not just to grow, but to **feel glad to be growing**.

Why We Celebrate

- Mark progress and transitions with intention
- Recognize effort, growth, and contribution—not just outcomes
- Anchor the year in meaningful traditions
- Foster connection across ages, abilities, and identities
- Infuse our learning rhythms with beauty, movement, and collective pride

Fieldwork, Excursions, & Expeditions

We don't just talk about ecosystems, economies, or culture—we go out and encounter them. Fieldwork and excursions are integrated into our learning rhythm and tailored to deepen ongoing studies. From tidepool mapping and botanical sketching to visiting local farms or historical sites, students practice observation, documentation, and connection in real-world contexts.

Longer expeditions are sometimes offered for older students, deep-diving into specific topics, survival skills, or regional studies. These are **journeys of curiosity**, **challenge**, **and shared discovery**—always rooted in safety, trust, and student readiness.

Whether a 1-hour local walk or a multi-day journey, our off-site learning is grounded in the belief that place shapes knowledge—and that knowing where you stand changes how you move.

Nature-Based & Outdoor Learning

Outdoor learning is not a special occasion at Ceiba Nova—it's a vital part of our pedagogical core. Students regularly learn under the trees, beside the creek, or out in the open sky. Nature offers **unmatched multisensory engagement**, **emotional regulation**, **and authentic inquiry**—especially for neurodiverse learners.

From constructing rainwater catchments to studying leaf morphology or tracing animal tracks, students use the natural world as both subject and setting. We also integrate **land stewardship**, **climate literacy**, **and ecological thinking** throughout.

This isn't just about being outside. It's about **belonging to a place, understanding** it, and caring for it in return.

Studio & Lab Intensives

Focused time. Real tools. Deep-dive learning.

Studio & Lab Intensives are immersive periods where students hone skills, build projects, or explore a discipline in depth. These may span a few days or a few weeks, and are often hands-on, interdisciplinary, and portfolio-based.

Intensives may include:

- Carpentry and construction workshops
- Environmental science labs
- Theatrical or music productions
- Visual arts and design sprints
- Engineering & invention challenges

Each intensive blends creativity, critical thinking, and collaborative problemsolving, supported by tools and mentorship that match the task at hand.

Apprenticeship & Community-Based Learning

Physical & Emotional Safety Protocols

Protection without fear. Structure with flexibility.

We maintain clear, developmentally appropriate safety protocols for all activities—whether indoors, outdoors, on campus, or in the wider community. These include:

Regularly reviewed safety walk-throughs

On-site risk assessments for learning environments and materials

Clear adult-to-student ratios for supervision

Designated safety zones for physical activities and tool use

Boundaries and expectations communicated in age-appropriate ways

Active, compassionate adult presence to de-escalate and support

Clear safety training, guidelines, & protective gear for labs & construction

Emotional safety is equally prioritized. Our approach is proactive, not punitive. We build safety through relationships, trust, and the reliable presence of a stable adult guide. This creates the kind of environment where students feel secure enough to take intellectual and social risks—and to return to connection when challenges arise.

Emergency Preparedness & Communication

Prepared, not panicked.

Ceiba Nova maintains emergency protocols for common scenarios including injury, fire, weather events, and natural disasters. Students regularly engage in calm, trauma-informed safety drills.

All **staff are trained in emergency response, first aid, and communication chains**. Families receive a copy of our **Emergency Response & Communication Plan** upon enrollment and as part of annual updates.

In the event of any emergency or unexpected closure, we communicate with families immediately via multiple channels, prioritizing **accuracy, transparency, and timely updates**. Emergency contact forms are updated quarterly, and families are encouraged to notify us of any changes as they arise.

Our goal is to ensure that **every student knows**:

- What to do
- Who to trust
- Where to go

-without increasing anxiety or fear.





Wellness Practices & Mental Health Supports

We care for the whole child, not just the symptoms.

Ceiba Nova integrates **wellness and mental health into our daily rhythms**—not as separate lessons, but as living practices. This includes:

- Daily grounding routines and mindfulness practices
- Movement and sensory breaks
- Flexible workspaces for regulation and comfort
- Individual check-ins and emotional literacy support
- Optional journaling, visual processing, or private reflection spaces
- · Access to an on-call, licensed school counselor for additional guidance

When deeper support is needed, we collaborate with a credentialed school counselor (PPS), a licensed educational psychologist, and local specialists to provide consultation, design appropriate interventions, or facilitate referrals.

If a student requires ongoing individual support or intervention through a paraprofessional or specialist, we will explore solutions as a community, such as cost-sharing or offering training opportunities for family volunteers, when appropriate. Although we cannot guarantee coverage of expenses associated with hiring a specialist or paraprofessional, we commit to actively partnering with families to ensure every student receives consistent support, compassion, and stability.

Ceiba Nova is rooted in trust. That trust depends on transparency, clear agreements, and principled action. Below are key policy areas designed to protect students, guide community expectations, and uphold our shared values of equity, dignity, and care.

Data, Privacy, & Consent

We take student and family privacy seriously. Ceiba Nova collects only the information necessary to support student learning, safety, and well-being. Personal data—including educational records, learning profiles, photographs, and assessment results—is stored securely and never shared with third parties without explicit, informed consent.

Our media release policy is opt-in only. By default, we do not publicly share student photos or videos. In situations where we wish to highlight student work or learning processes through photos or videos that are completely free of identifying details (such as names, faces, voices, or other personal information), we may use such materials in our handbook, website, programs, or promotional content. If appropriate, students and families will be asked whether the student would like to receive credit (such as a byline) for their featured work.

For any sharing of student images or identifiable work, we require explicit consent from both the student and their parent or guardian.

- Photos, video, and student work are only shared publicly (e.g., on our website or social media) with active written permission from parenting-adults and students.
- Private family portals and student portfolios contain photos, video, and student work as a record and are not accessible to the public.
- Parenting adults may update or revoke media permissions at any time.
- Health records, diagnostic reports, and learning profiles are kept strictly confidential and reviewed solely by authorized professionals, in accordance with HIPAA regulations and applicable ethical and legal standards.

Consent is not a formality—it's an ongoing agreement rooted in respect.

Digital Device & Media Use

At Ceiba Nova, we use technology **intentionally, not habitually**. Screens are tools—not replacements for hands-on experience, human connection, or wonder.

- Most daily learning is screen-free or minimally tech-dependent.
- When digital tools are used (e.g., for research, documentation, coding, or publishing), they serve a **clear purpose and are integrated with care**.
- Personal devices (phones, tablets, etc.) are not authorized on campus and will
 not be used during learning hours unless previously identified in writing for

- Students are taught to approach media with discernment, curiosity, and care —including conversations about digital safety, representation, and boundaries.

We teach not just how to use tech—but when and why to use it.

Intentional Technology & Media Practices

Tools, not toys. Purpose, not distraction

At Ceiba Nova, technology is treated as a **powerful tool—not an automatic default**. Our approach is intentional, gradual, and rooted in deep respect for both the benefits and risks of digital devices.

Screen-Free Foundations First

At Ceiba Nova, **technological thinking and safe, intentional screen use** are woven throughout our Core Badges in **Personal Safety, Technology, and Research & Information Literacy**. We introduce these concepts through a diverse range of hands-on activities, lessons, and real-world applications tied to each badge milestone—never as a one-size-fits-all module.

For example, we've invested in a licensed, evidence-backed, screen-free coding and robotics system to reinforce foundational logic, systems thinking, and problem-solving skills. This isn't the sole entry point for tech learning, but it illustrates our commitment to sourcing rigorous, research-supported tools that minimize "convenient" screen time without compromising depth or quality of instruction.

As students master these off-screen foundations, we then introduce screens and devices in a purposeful, project-based way—always aligned with developmental readiness and the learning goals of each badge.

Tech Badges & Digital Milestones

Our badge system includes **tiered badges for technology use and media safety**. Students work toward milestones in areas such as:

At every level, students engage with discussions and lessons on:

- Digital citizenship
- Coding and programming
- Social media discernment
- Research ethics
- Online collaboration
- Cybersecurity basics

These badges emphasize both **technical skills and ethical awareness**—ensuring students become not just capable users, but also conscientious digital citizens.

Our goal is not to produce more screen users. It's to raise empowered, intentional toolmakers and media-literate thinkers.

Equity, Access, & Anti-Discrimination

Ceiba Nova is a place where all children belong, and all identities are respected.

We do not tolerate discrimination based on race, ethnicity, language, neurotype, disability, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, nationality, socioeconomic status, or family structure.

Grievance, Feedback & Policy Review

We value open communication and community trust. To standardize submissions—and allow anonymous reporting—we offer an online feedback form. Concerns may also be raised verbally or in writing, and all reports are acknowledged promptly.

- We respond to every concern with open dialogue, not defensiveness, as well as transparency, respect, and a collaborative spirit.
- All complaints are documented, reviewed seriously by leadership, and addressed in a timely manner.
- Regular community check-ins and anonymous surveys provide additional opportunities for reflection and input.
- Policies remain living documents: we review them annually and refine them based on community feedback, evolving needs, and best practices.

Non-Negotiable Equity Commitments

Our human-rights and equity policies are absolute. We affirm every individual's identity—across gender, relationship diversity, and neurotype—and include global perspectives in our curriculum. We do not censor or ban books, nor teach revisionist histories. Grievances rooted in personal or religious objections to another's inherent rights or identity will not be discussed but not advanced. All feedback and policy review must align with our commitment to advancing equity, inclusion, and respect for every member of our community.
